1. Local news

Hello, dear members of the APTS West-Central Montreal!

SANTÉ QUÉBEC AND THE NEW BILL: You may have heard recently about changes affecting Santé Québec and an upcoming bill to modify the process of negotiating collective agreements.

Treasury Board president Sonia LeBel announced in December that she intends to carry out a reform of the collective agreement negotiating process for the public and parapublic sectors. She also said that in this context, she wants to avoid major changes to union certifications that would lead to union raiding soon.

The National Assembly resumed its work on January 28, and the bill won't be tabled before the end of February. When it is tabled, we'll analyze its provisions and their impact on the public sector bargaining process, and we'll suggest improvements. But we'll have to wait for the actual text of the bill to understand the rules that would officially put an end to raiding and to know for sure that it will not take place. Until then, we think it is wise to act cautiously.

AUSTERITY MEASURES: On December 19th, we told you about our local action, "Riposte contre les mesures d'austérité dans le RSSS". We contacted six MNAS from ridings in West-Central Montreal territory (D'Arcy McGee, Notre-Dame-de-Grâce (NDG), Westmount-Saint-Louis, Laurier-Dorion, Maurice-Richard and Nelligan) to denounce budget cuts.

So far, we have heard back from five MNAs. First to respond were the MNA for Nelligan, Moussef Derraji (Québec Libéral Party), and the MNA for Maurice-Richard, Haroun Bouazzi (Québec Solidaire). They told us they had shared our information with the MNAs responsible for health and social services, i.e., for the Liberals, Pontiac MNA André Fortin, who is the health care spokesperson for the official opposition, and for Québec Solidaire, MNAs Guillaume Cliche-Rivard and Vincent Marissal. I had several written exchanges with Mr. Marissal, the MNA for Rosemont and Québec Solidaire spokesperson for health care issues. He was receptive and available to join in a mobilization action.

Désirée McGraw, the Liberal MNA for NDG, told us she shares our concerns about the current state of the public health and social services system and that we can count on her commitment, and on the commitment of her colleagues André Fortin, Linda Caron and Elisabeth Prass, to speak on behalf of professionals employed in the system and defend the interests of Québec patients. She emphasized the fact that "the CAQ government had promised to significantly improve the health care system by making it more efficient and more human. But we are seeing the opposite. Service users are entitled to safe and humane care; care workers deserve a safe, healthy and stimulating work environment." Elisabeth Prass, the Liberal MNA for D'Arcy-McGee, has asked to meet us in person on March 13th.





Your APTS local OHS committee is developing a **reporting kit** to clarify the **process for reporting a risky or dangerous situation.** The kit will also provide examples of completed forms for the **six types of risk** (chemical, biological, related to safety, ergonomic, physical and psychosocial). At our next Union Council meeting, liaison officers will be trained to support their team members in filling out reporting forms for risky or dangerous situations. This will help us reach a large number of teams at once. The kit will be available through our local page.

The **conference on domestic violence in the workplace** will be offered to liaison officers on March 11.

CALL TO ACTION - DELAY IN IMPLEMENTING THE COLLECTIVE AGREEMENT

For months now, we have grown increasingly frustrated and concerned about the situation in the health care system. These delays compromise not only the quality of care we can offer Quebecers, but also the quality of services we are entitled to as system users.

Without worker mobilization, the health and social services system will continue to slip through our fingers.

If you are eligible for **premiums, lump sums, work-time arrangements or the reimbursement of dues paid to a professional order**, we encourage you to take action today to put pressure on the employer and receive what you're owed.

February: Black History Month
